Early career started with the DU (Denver University) Hill Toppers at age 8. Went on to swim with the Colorado Rapids Swim Team at Celebrity Sports Center in Denver, Colorado.

As a junior in High School, George qualified for his first Olympic Trials where he placed 13th in the 1500-meter freestyle and 18th in the 400-meter freestyle.

During his senior year of high school at Thomas Jefferson, George swam at the state high school championships and placed first in the 200 and 500 yard freestyle setting two state and pool records at the Air Force Academy. He also achieved All-American status in those events.

George decided on attending The University of Arizona and Dick Jochums, the head coach there. While in college, he was a 10 time All-American, and named the PAC-10 Conference Swimmer of the Year in 1984. Named Colorado Amateur Athlete of the Year 1984. Colorado's first Olympic Gold Medalist in Swimming. He was also awarded the prestigious PAC-10 Gold Medal for Academic Achievement and Athletic Leadership, representing the University of Arizona , 1985. Inducted into the University of Arizona Hall of Fame, 1990.

In 1996 George was a torch bearer for the Atlanta Summer Games. In 2002 he was asked to swim the winter Olympic torch for the Salt Lake City Games. This is the first time that an Olympic Winter Torch has been swum.

In 2009 on International Olympic Day the United States Olympic Committee recognized George on the 25th Anniversary of his Olympics and for his contribution as a leader inspiring individuals and the community to strive for excellence.
